The Ring of Silence is based on real events that happened to teens in a Michigan high school. The film's director Nicole Bowers Wallace said that "it's a film that everybody needs to see."

This film is rated for PG-13 audiences so they can understand that the perpetrators look like attractive young men and women in their school, like the kid on Instagram or Snapchat, or even like the guy next door. A panel of local experts will be available for Q&A immediately after the film.

The human trafficking epidemic has victimized over 8,000 people in Michigan in the last decade alone. The victims are our daughters and sons, our students, our neighbors.

In honor of Missing and Murdered Indigenous Awareness Month, The Keweenaw Bay Indian Community Niimigimiwang Transitional Home Program & Services in partnership with the Upper Peninsula Human Trafficking Task Force (UPHTTF) say it is time we speak up louder than silence.
